that shines. This gives us courage to endure in faith. What makes the wise ones wise? This endurance and trust in the light, the star they follow.

Our call is measured not in our certainty about things, but by our desire for Christ in our lives. This desire for Christ is itself a gift from God, a gift which joins us to the divine. So, Christ's call was met by a fierce desire within his disciples. Have you heard this call? Have you found this desire?

So now we begin the month of February. And we are still following Jesus. As we move through the next weeks of epiphany, revelation, Jesus sits us down on a hillside and teaches us a few things. And a strange teaching it is, even upside down. I am talking, of course, about the Sermon of the Mount. That's our territory for the next few Sundays. He turns everything around. The poor, the mournful, the un-powerful, least of these are the very ones Jesus calls blessed. Given the expectations that we carry and that we meet in our day to day lives, that seems just a bit too much, requiring within us a change of heart. But, it gets better.

As Jesus instructs us in prayer, he takes prayer of the ego rich worldly realm and locates prayer in the closet. He uses ripe images, birds, lilies, lights and bushels as he reveals divine currents alive in the world. He has ideas about the law, making our lives more

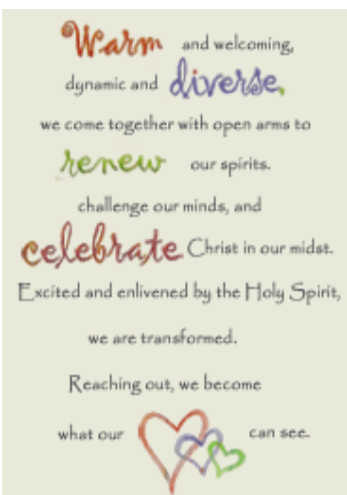

by our worship, our bellies will be warmed a potluck meal in Friendship Hall. Bring something to share. All are welcome!



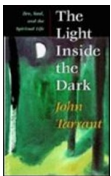
## **CABARET**

## *Book Study: The Light Inside the Dark*



John Tarrant's, "The Light Inside the Dark" is a spiritual exercise, an invitation to the spiritual life. Tarrant chronicles the path of transformation, of diving deep, exploring and discovering the life at the heart of things - in those spaces where you might expect such an encounter, and in those more mysterious spaces where you might not. Using stories east and west, John takes us along the human route of initiation, descent and ascent, encouraging an intimacy with life that is at once personal and extends beyond the bounds of personality. Tar-

rant's book is an important book in that it shows how an eastern approach to Spirit might be enhanced and deepened by the western emphasis on Soul and character development. David Parks-Ramage will be leading a book study on "The Light Inside the Dark." The approach will be transformational, that is, all participants will bring their own lives and experience to the group as we study the book. The 6 sessions began on **January 14 at 7 pm** and run every two weeks thereafter. The book is available in the church office.

## *Ruth's Good News!*

### **January 5, 2014**

We celebrated Epiphany with glimpses of God. Pastor David said perhaps we will find ourselves on the journey. The two Kings: Roger Allington and John Derby, and the Queen, Andrea Petersen (age 5), brought gifts as they followed the Star. He quoted Walt Whitman: "When I Heard the Learned Astronomer" he was silent in reverence for the stars.

David noted that our journey will probably have obstacles "*du Jour*." Nelson Mandela said, "Keep one's head pointed toward the sun, one's feet moving forward." Deb Smith read the passage Matthew 2:1-12. Sandy Rosen and Gayle Madison provided healing oils for the communion service. Gayle's backyard includes some olive trees that provided the olive oil, blessed for "healing of body, soul and spirit," during the service.

Christa Durand and Chris Alexander provided the special music. Christa's father is the contractor who put in our skylights over the chancel. She created a CD, "Abide with Me" (\$15) including lyrics of love's presence. (<http://www.christadurand.weebly.com>)

### **January 11, 2014**

High on the hill near the southern end of Petaluma, some of our members came to see Meredith Jackson take the next step to ordination. On the only rainy day we had in January (or December or November), we filled the first two rows of the lovely Petaluma UCC. There were members from Samosan, Sebastopol, Petaluma, and the PSR seminary and her work groups. Mary and Drew Jackson had to miss their daughter's meeting, because they were leading a Road Scholar educational trip.

Meredith answered questions from the delegates, and later, she was approved. She has started to work in St. Louis, for a Disciples of Christ church in a challenging urban area.

### **January 12, 2014**

Pastor David interpreted for our time Mark 1:9-12, read by Winnie Hogoboom. Mark understood that only Jesus saw the dove coming from Heaven. It was not visible to the crowd on the riverbank. Mark knew that Jesus was the only one who heard the voice of God. This is Mark's Nativity scene: Jesus came out of the river water knowing that he was God's beloved. David said that we can know "we are the Beloved." Under daily life's challenges and troubles, always there is God's love, a deep current of love and support. This moment after baptism in the water, where Jesus gasped for air, was the

beginning for his ministry, his Genesis moment. After his baptism, Jesus went to the wilderness.

The sermon was based on the latest book study, "The Light Inside the Dark: Zen, Soul, and the Spiritual Life" by John Tarrant, meeting alternate Tuesdays at 7pm.

Charlotte Asher talked to the six children about finding words they could understand in the God talk.

Family choir today lacked its young singers. Perhaps it was because of a football game 49ers over Panthers. Our anthem, "Lift your Light" was strong because Gwen Birkedal joined the singers.

### **January 18, 2013**

"In the beginning... Beginnings matter," David said. The Bible passage was John 2:1-11. Pastor David quoted Martin Luther King, Jr. as he preached Jesus' words to begin the end of discrimination. "Love your enemies, bless them that curse you... Protest courageously, with dignity and Christian love..." King began the civil rights movement this way. Jesus turned water into wine at a party, after his mother noticed that the host was running out of wine. He was hesitant to use his new powers, but he was present to this opportunity. God's powers through Jesus show abundant blessings in a ministry of presence. We can use these abundant blessings to make new beginnings as we live with others. When we act, we begin with Jesus' words.

The service was dedicated to ailing members, those in our prayer list. And it was also dedicated to the need for rain. Carrie MacFarlane read the scripture.

### **January 26, 2014**

David Parks-Ramage interpreted Matthew 4:12-23, read by John Derby. Jesus gave his friends the opportunity to a new life. He began his recruiting work from Capernaum, a humble sort of town, with fishermen and simple folk. "Down in the Valley... valley so low." The helpers he chose: Peter, Andrew, James and John, were mending nets, simple workers. They followed Jesus because they trusted and had a desire to please him. David said when we experience the greatest things in life, we may be uncertain, but we have desire and the passion. The call is sent to each, to follow our passion, to desire to serve life. We sang the Summons, "to follow and never be the same," a Scottish song from the Iona Community. Nancy Turner sang "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee" accompanied by Chris Alexander on the grand piano, and three flutists, Evelyn Smith, Dale Webb, Ruth Webber.
